## A Brief History of Farming on Salt Spring Island

Salt Spring Island "will always be remembered as absolutely the first agricultural settlement in the then Colony of Vancouver Island." *Edward Mallandaine in his B. C. Directory, 1887* 

1859	first 17 settlers arrive to begin farming on Salt Spring
1859 to 2010	seed companies growing all their own seeds on Salt Spring
1859 to 1863	Begg's Nursery serving BC
1913 to 1930	James Seed Company distributing to the Empire and Commonwealth
2010	Salt Spring Seeds distributing worldwide
1860	cattle came by boat and swam ashore
1871	Salt Spring Farmer J.P. Booth elected to 1st BC Legislature
1902	J.P. Booth appointed Speaker
1886	Marketing became easier with better steamship servicegoods previously rowed by boat to Victoria
1892	Dept. Of Agriculture reported the following on the Farms in the Beaver Point Area:
	Quantity of land cultivated: 280 acres
	Number of tons of grain produced: 20 tons
	Number of tons of hay produced: 220 tons
	Number of tons of root crops produced: 150 tons
	Number of tons of fruit produced: 30 tons
	Number of cattle owned: 90 head
	Number of horses owned: 23 head
	Number of sheep owned: 650 head
	Number of swine owned: 65 head
	As stated, these numbers are only for the Beaver Point Area but are an indication of general farm activity on the island.
	The largest orchard on the Island had 1600 Apple Trees. They were shipping 1800 to 2400 boxes of apples per year @ 40 lbs. per box.
1896	First Fall Fair on Salt Spring
1904 to 1957	The Creamery Co-operative was the mainstay of the Island's economy. Virtually every farmer on the Island sold to the creamery. Peak output of the creamery came in 1928 and about 140,000 lbs. of butter were produced annually.
1948	The years following the second World War saw a steady decline in agriculture on Salt Spring.
1976	The revival of the Fall Fair saw a renewed interest in agriculture and a slow turn-around began.
2008	In January 2008, an Area Farm Plan for Salt Spring Island was introduced to the community. Entitled "Plan to Farm," this plan will hopefully return agriculture to it's once held lofty heights in the economy and life style of Salt Spring Island.
